it's important to remember every little bit helps; working together we reduce the trash in our watersheds and ultimately, the oceans.










RA bookmarks featuring River of Words art and poetry from Georgia students


RiversAlive.org offered a Cleanup Guide and other resources, like mentor lists, activities, and waiver forms

100% of state level donations were distributed out to support all of our cleanup groups. Groups also rely on local sponsors to provide trash bags, gloves, insect repellent and first aid kits. Some get contributions of refreshments and food. Many find additional funding to purchase extra RA T-shirts for their cleanup volunteers.

In 2012, the Tybee Beautification Association conducted over 20 cleanups, attracting more than 1,000 volunteers who removed 5 tons of trash. Cleanup activity focused on the main road entering the island and on conducting beach sweeps, meeting at the piers for bags and gloves. Volunteers were so astounded at how many cigarette butts they found – an average of 300 per volunteer – that they were ready to ban all smoking from the public beaches! Next time you're on a beach vacation, consider joining a local cleanup activity.
