### Rivers Alive Committee Reports

### **Education & Messaging**

The theme for 2017, "I Georgia," highlighted the importance of preserving the 70,250 miles of rivers and coastline that make up Georgia's waterways, as well as the many services they provide. Engaging people in their local waterways allows them to build a stronger connection to their natural environment and understand the direct impact of their behaviors. Seeing the condition of these streams before and after proves that even small numbers can yield tremendous results! Thank you for your continued support in this effort.

Resources we made available:

- Rivers Alive education poster included a classroom activity on the back, The Watershed Tarp, to increase students' awareness of non-point source pollution in their watershed
- Rivers Aliye bookmarks featuring River of Words art and poetry from Georgia students
- Quarterly e-newsletters to keep cleanup organizers and sponsors up-to-date on news and activities

### **Event Coordination & Outreach**

This year we provided our local organizers with resources, like trash bags and a land and paddle guide, as well as safety information and waiver forms. The awards ceremony continues to help celebrate the outstanding efforts of Georgia's cleanup organizers. Rivers Alive volunteers joined organized paddle trips around the state promoting cleanups and spreading awareness among other citizens about how everyday trash affects our rivers.

### **Fundraising**

100% of state level donations were distributed to support cleanup groups. Groups also rely on local sponsors to provide trash bags, gloves, insect repellent and first aid kits. Some get contributions of refreshments and food. Many find additional funding to purchase extra Rivers Alive T-shirts for their cleanup volunteers.

### **T-Shirts**

Once again, our most coveted "Thank You" to our volunteers comes in the form of our Rivers Alive T-shirt. Some volunteers have collected all 19 shirts ever produced!

### The Spotlight is on

### Attracting Local Sponsorship

Rivers Alive is dependent on corporate sponsorship to support cleanups across the state. However, many local programs have found ways to attract their own sponsorship, primarily through in kind support.

This year, in-kind support came in the form of food and drinks, trash bags, gloves and trash grabbers. Cleanups received first aid kits, bug spray, sunscreen, sanitation products and even safety vests. Some organizers reported receiving prizes to incentivize volunteer participation, highlighting the most unusual item found or the most trash removed. Waterway cleanups found immediate partners with local outfitters, who provided free kayaks and canoes for volunteers to access hard to reach trash. Likewise, many local parks waived parking fees and provided shelters for participants. Without a doubt, the single biggest support came from local governments helping to collect and haul off the trash, dropping off dumpsters and taking care of tire disposal. Many local governments even footed the bill for extra t-shirts, and some paid for all the shirts for their volunteers. Local utilities even provided free advertisements, one estimated at a value in excess of \$13,000!

The total value of this in-kind support would be hard to calculate, but a quick review of the 2017 results indicates it was in the tens of thousands of dollars, maybe even matching or exceeding the total support Rivers Alive receives from state level sponsors. The common thread in all of this is—if you ask, you never know what you might receive. We recommend all organizers consider reaching out to request local support of your efforts. Businesses appreciate being associated with "feel-good" activities, and there aren't too many that can top a Rivers Alive cleanup.

Good luck in 2018 reaching out to new partners to help clean our rivers, lakes and coastal waters!
