




Our Mission:






NEXT YEAR


In 2014 Ryan and Nissa Hall published a book titled *The League of Protectors: Secret of the Jewel*, after a family trip to the Georgia Sea Turtle Center ignited a passion for coastal conservation. Though The League of Protectors began as a fictional group, it has now become a very real, dedicated volunteer organization making measurable impacts on coastal pollution. Driven by a passion for service and a love for Georgia's barrier islands, the Hall family and other volunteers have collected hundreds of pounds of trash in coastal cleanup efforts, including more than 130 pounds of trash during a recent Rivers Alive event on Jekyll Island.

The devoted volunteers of The League of Protectors routinely travel more than 10 hours roundtrip to their cleanup sites, visiting Bloody Marsh on St. Simon's Island at least once a quarter. They frequently partner with other community organizations, especially working to educate and involve kids in conservation efforts. They have helped scout troops earn merit badges and are currently holding an essay contest, used to select two students to attend a junior marine biologist camp on the coast this summer.

Community partner Lea King-Badyna with Keep Golden Isles Beautiful adds, "The League of Protectors demonstrate that, anyone of any age and at any time, can make a positive impact on our environment. Their actions will surely inspire and engage countless Georgians to also find ways to make a difference."

Message from the Chair



We had another excellent year with over 25,000 volunteers engaged in cleanups throughout the state removing over half a million pounds of trash from Georgia's waterways in some 268 cleanup events.

Thanks to the staff of the Georgia Environmental Protection Division for keeping the program running and to the Rivers Alive Advisory Board for their ideas and support. Event Coordination & Outreach

In addition to providing trash bags and field data forms for tallying cleanup data, Rivers Alive makes available guides for land and paddle cleanups for local organizers. Other resources, like safety information, PSAs and waiver forms can be found on the website. The awards ceremony continues to recognize the outstanding efforts of Georgia's cleanup organizers.

And, for the first time, Rivers Alive partnered with Georgia Association of Water Professionals to produce No Water No Beer, a fun networking gathering at a local craft brewery, to celebrate the need for clean water in all walks of life.

Rivers Alive joined in organized paddle trips around the state promoting cleanups and spreading awareness among citizens about how everyday trash affects our rivers.


Education & Messaging

Focusing on the journey trash makes in Georgia waterways, the theme for 2015 highlighted the need to collect complete data reports on the health of our watersheds. The trash we find tells a story; each piece gives us an idea of the challenges we face in safeguarding our environment. By piecing together these reports, we can begin gathering valuable data on priorities for future Rivers Alive cleanups. Thank you for your continued support in this effort.

100% of state level donations were distributed to support cleanup groups. Groups also rely on local sponsors to provide trash bags, gloves, insect repellent and first aid kits.
